UNITED IN FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH EDUCATION ENDOWMENT SCHOLARSHIP

United in Faith Lutheran Church has established an Education Endowment Scholarship Fund which is available to members of our congregation. Students who have a financial need can apply for assistance. Eligible awards can be for any Christian pre-school through high school as well as any post-secondary school and can include special educational needs or gifts at any level of education.

Each application is carefully reviewed by the Education Endowment Scholarship Committee. Awards are based on need and funds available. The application forms are available in the church office and must be completed in full to be considered for a scholarship for the school year 2021-2022 and returned no later than February 28, 2021. Place the completed form in the church mail box marked "Scholarship" located in the hallway or give to any scholarship committee member or you may mail to the church office marked "Attn Schlorship". All information on the application will be treated as confidential.

- Applicants must be active members of United in Faith Lutheran Church.
- Identify, to the best of your knowledge, all school related expenses for the school year, plus any other source of income or assistance you have to meet those expenses.
- Applicants and their parent(s)/guardian(s)/legal care giver(s) must participate in the life of
 United in Faith Church. This can include but is not limited to: serving as an acolyte, usher,
 reader, assisting minister, Sunday School aide or teacher, participation in fund raising activities,
 and assisting with church events to the extent that is reasonable and possible.
- Attendance at worship is required.

The Committee will then give careful consideration for awards on each application. Applicants will be notified of the Committee's decision by March 31, 2021. An applicant may receive a scholar-ship in subsequent years as long as they meet the requirements. Scholarship amounts may vary from year to year based on the number of applicants and funds available each year.

Why I Drive a Hybrid? By Pastor Carla

The Justice Ministry has asked me to write a little "testimony" on hybrid and electric vehicles. Since 2014, my husband and I have owned 2 Toyota hybrids and 1 Nissan electric vehicle. We made these decisions for financial and environmental reasons. Even hybrid and electric vehicles use natural resources, but we have looked closely at the trade-offs and we decided that they were wiser financial and environmental investments. We sought to minimize our family's carbon footprint (not easy as an active

family of five in the suburbs). We wanted to support newer environmental technologies (without being the guinea pigs for entirely untested products). When we "crunched" the numbers, it was clear that these vehicles would cost less than the less fuel-efficient vehicles we had driven before. The large batteries in hybrid and electric cars are designed for longevity (usually 10 years), but they can carry a significant cost if they fail (part of the consideration, especially if you're buying a used hybrid or electric vehicle).

Though electric and hybrid vehicles have been on the market for many years, many people still don't know much about them. There are three main types: hybrid, plug-in hybrid, and full electric. Most of these vehicles have a higher expense at purchase, but a lower over-time use cost (less gas or minimal electricity).

Hybrid cars are fueled with gasoline only (no plugging in or worrying about electric engine being charged). Many car makers offer hybrid versions. I drive a Prius V, which is a station wagon sized car and gets 40-45 mpg (my previous car got approximately 20 mpg). Hybrids recapture some energy during braking and store it as electricity which means that city driving is more fuel efficient in a hybrid (city and hwy mpg is often comparable). My Prius shuts down the gasoline engine and runs only on electric when stopped at a light (no "idling").

<u>Plug-in hybrids</u> can be fueled with both gasoline and electricity from an outlet or charger. Generally, these are electric cars with a supplemental gas engine. In some plug-in hybrids, the gas engine generates energy to power the electric engine. Others function more like a hybrid, with the option to plug-in to pre-charge the battery to save fuel. Fuel economy is harder to compare since these vehicles can run on electric, gas, or both. Plug-in hybrid fuel economy can be sensitive to driving style, driving conditions, and accessory use.

All-electric cars must be plugged in to charge the electric battery. Darryl drives a Nissan Leaf, which is an economy brand all-electric vehicle (as opposed to the Tesla, which has a much higher price tag, but similar technology and a longer range). You can't take a road trip in most electric vehicles, but charging stations (sometimes free) are available - maybe you've seen the free Volta charging stations at the HIP. Electric vehicles have "zero emissions" – no tailpipe pollutants (although the power plant producing the electricity may emit them). Electric motors accelerate faster ("it's all torque") and require less maintenance (no oil changes). Our Nissan Leaf has a max distance of 80 miles on a full charge (can be longer with thoughtful driving). Fully charging an all-electric vehicle with a 100 mile range and depleted battery would only cost about the same as operating an average central air conditioner for six hours.

The biggest question we get about our Nissan Leaf: Where do you charge your electric vehicle and how long does it take? A Level 1 charger can be connected to a normal grounded outlet (the same kind you can plug a toaster into), which fully charges the battery from 0% in about 12 hours. We usually charge our Leaf overnight. Since we don't drive 80 miles at a time, it rarely takes longer than 5-7 hours to reach 100%. Level 2 chargers can be found at many hospitals, office complexes, schools, Whole Foods, Walgreen's, and municipal buildings, fully charging a battery from 0% in about 4 hours (some free, others cost up to \$3/hour – compare that to your last gas fill-up). You can also economically install a Level 2 charger in your home. CHAdeMO DC fast chargers can be found in a few locations and can "fast charge" to 80% capacity can take 30 mins.
